#### CALL TO ORDER

The Executive Advisory Committee was called to order by Mr. Courtway, Chair.

#### APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF JUNE 21, 2016 MEETING

#### **DISCUSSION ITEMS**

#### **Review of Recent Great Streets Projects**

Paul Hubbman, EWGCOG, provided information on the latest round of Great Streets projects: Woodson Road, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Drive, North 14<sup>th</sup> Street, Gravois Road, and Smithton, IL. He summarized the project sites and described the approach taken by the project

teams (sponsors, EWGCOG, and consultants) to gather information and coordinate an open forum charrette wherein the community can coordinate with planners to combine local and technical knowledge and further shape the individual project. He noted that strategic planning reports follow each charrette and will be available on EWGCOG's website as they become available over the next month.

Additional discussion occurred regarding how the new format for developing Great Streets projects helps define feasible projects.

Mr. Wild, EWGCOG, advised that Outstanding Leadership in Government Achievement Awards (OLGA) nomination requests would be circulated in the very near future, and he encouraged the nomination of worthy individuals/groups.

In 2008, the Council completed a conceptual design study for the Northside-Southside Corridor, primarily within the City of St. Louis. That study identified, as a Locally Preferred Alternative, a light rail route extending from the area of Goodfellow/I-70 south to Bayless/I-55. The purpose of the present study is to reaffirm and update the earlier study's findings and to examine an alternative that would serve the proposed National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency site. The study is funded by the City of St. Louis.

To solicit consulting services for the study, the Council released a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) on July 20, 2016, with a closing date of August 19. Three consulting teams responded to the RFQ:

- AECOM as the lead consultant with subconsultants WSP/Parsons Brinckerhoff, Development Strategies, Arcturis, RSG, Vector Communications, EDSI, and Kivindyo Engineering;
- HDR as lead consultant with subconsultants Jacobs, Vector Communications, CMT, EDSI, HG Consult, Kaskaskia Engineering, Kivindyo Engineering, and SB Friedman;
- HNTB as lead consultant with subconsultants David Mason and Associates, Innis Consulting, Lion CSG, Lochmueller, TranSystems, and Vector Communications.

A selection committee representing the City of St. Louis, Metro, MoDOT, and the Council reviewed and scored the proposals, selected two of the three consulting teams (AECOM and HDR) for interviews, and conducted the interviews. The selection committee subsequently recommended that the contract be awarded to the team led by AECOM.

The Council will be the responsible contracting party.

**Staff Recommendation:** Staff recommends that the Executive Director be authorized to negotiate and enter into a contract with AECOM. In the event that a contract cannot be successfully negotiated with AECOM, staff recommends identical authorization to negotiate and enter into a contract with HDR. The contract amount will not exceed \$2 million.

Subject: Regional Security Expenditures

Date: September 14, 2016

Staff is requesting authorization to expend funds in support of regional security that will improve the region's disaster preparedness and response capabilities. Funding will come from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) grant program. Attachment A summarizes these purchases totaling \$86,759. Also attached is a summary description of all budgeted expenditures from the UASI grants (Attachment B).

- 1. Responder Force Protection & Rehabilitation Unit (Rehab Unit) The St. Louis Regional EMS Task Force is staging two Responder Force Protection & Rehabilitation Units in the St. Louis region. These Rehab Units are emergency response vehicles that are deployed when dealing with a Mass Casualty Incident. This on scene medical resource provides medical evaluation of emergency response personnel at the scene of prolonged events or during extreme weather conditions by providing specialized medical assessments and services to first responders working on scene. One Rehab Unit is currently staged with St. Clair County Special Emergency Services in Belleville, Illinois. A second unit will be staged at Christian Hospital in North St. Louis County. Therefore, we are requesting approval to purchase one BaseX Shelter and a Heart Defibrillator with Monitor for the Christian Hospital Unit. Total costs will not exceed \$69,245.
- 2. Metro Air Support Unit Cockpit Flight Display Systems In June staff received approval to purchase new flight display systems for two of the Metro Air Support Unit's helicopters. There is a need to obtain the aircraft technical engineering data from the helicopter manufacture which addresses the correct installation of the new flight display systems. This technical data is imperative to the operation of the unit and protects its warranty. Total cost will not exceed \$17,514.

The purchases described in this memo are being made in accordance with the agency's procurement policy.

**<u>Staff Recommendation</u>**: Staff recommends that the Board approve the expenditure of funds as follows:

- for the purchase of a BaseX Shelter from Veterans Corp in an amount not to exceed \$26,154;
- for the purchase of a Heart Defibrillator with Monitor from Zoll Medical Corporation for in amount not to exceed \$43,091; and,
- for the purchase of the MD Helicopter Technical Bulletin "Garmin G500H Upgrade Authorization" from MD Helicopter, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$17,514,

for a total amount not to exceed \$86,759 from the UASI grant program.
