CALL TO ORDER

The Executive Advisory Committee was called to order by Mr. Fields, Chair.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF SEPTEMBER 22, 2015 MEETING

Motion was made by Mr. Wiese, seconded by Mr. Hagerty, to approve the minutes of the September 22, 2015 meeting. Motion carried, all voting aye.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

St. Louis Regional Freight District

Mary Lamie, St. Louis Regional Freight District, provided a brief history of the Freight District, which has been tasked with capitalizing on assets and to strengthen and promote regional multimodal opportunities so as to accelerate economic growth within the region, through proper planning, programming and coordination. She summarized and described the regional assets and goals required to implement the Freight District's mission. Ms. Lamie advised that a Working Group meeting will be held on October 23, 2015. She also noted that the Freight District's website will be launched in early 2016.

Lumina Foundation's Community Partnership for Attainment

Alan Byrd, Jr. and Allison Williams, St. Louis Graduates, and Anne Klein, St. Louis Regional Chamber, provided information and statistics in support of the regional effort underway to expand college access and increase post-secondary degree attainment. In partnership with the Lumina Foundation, an independent foundation based in Indianapolis, the St. Louis Regional Chamber and St. Louis Graduates are working toward strengthening regional understanding, college readiness, financial aid, and workforce readiness to reach the goal, regionally, of increasing the proportion of Americans with high-quality post-secondary degrees and credentials to 60 percent by the year 2025. Of note, the Lumina Foundation is planning to convene in St. Louis in February 2016.

St. Louis Regional Digital Microwave Network

Nick Gragnani, STARRS, provided a timeline of the project to create a plan to address issues associated with obsolete equipment, the multitude of interoperable radio frequencies throughout the region, and a FCC Narrowband Mandate. The state of the art microwave network, now complete, has eliminated areas with limited coverage, allowing system users to consistently maintain communications. He displayed and described a map detailing the 76 microwave sites, noting that the design features near-perfect reliability in all counties, except for Franklin, which did not join in. He noted that an agreement remains in place with Alcatel-Lucent Technologies for future expansion of the system to include text and video messaging to 911. Mr. Gragnani added that future work also includes developing the St. Louis Regional Communications Guide, which outlines the various land mobile radio systems available in the region to provide guidance for preparation by regional planners; training to teach the users the functions and frequencies of the new radio equipment; and future communication exercises to test the system while providing operational training to end users.

Motion approving the recommendations was made by Mr. Elmestad, seconded by Mr. Curran. Motion carried, all voting aye.

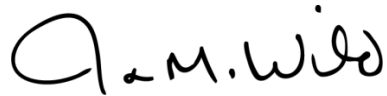
OTHER BUSINESS

Subject: Federal Equitable Sharing Program

The Department of Justice has announced that it has suspended the Federal Equitable Sharing program. That program allows police agencies around the country to provide officers to serve on federal task forces or participate in investigations where local police work intersects with criminal activity being investigated by federal agencies. Asset forfeiture funds are used to pay the salaries of police officers who replace the officers assigned to federal task forces. Further, the funds go to support police officer training center, community education and for maintenance and operation of law enforcement equipment and facilities.

While various agencies are working to try to restore all or part of the program, it is important that you be aware of the effects of the suspension. Attached is a memo from County Executive Steve Ehlmann of St. Charles County requesting that the East-West Gateway Council of Governments Board of Directors consider adoption of a resolution regarding the Federal Equitable Sharing Program. The resolution is intended to inform our Senators and Representatives about the suspension of the program and its impacts.

RE: Federal Equitable Sharing Program

On December 21, 2015, the Department of Justice announced that it had suspended, for some indefinite and unknown period of time, the Federal Equitable Sharing program. As you are probably aware, that program allows police agencies around the country to provide officers to serve on federal task forces or participate in investigations where local police work intersects with criminal activity being investigated by federal agencies. Depending on the role the local agency played in the investigation, the local share can be as little as two or three percent or as much as 75 percent. Local agencies may spend their share of the funds pursuant to a very limited list of acquisitions or activities approved by the Department of Justice (DOJ) in its "Guide to Equitable Sharing for State and Local Law Enforcement Agencies" as well as DOJ's "The National Code of Professional Conduct for Asset Forfeiture."

Asset forfeiture funds in our various governments are used to pay the salaries of police officers who replace the officers assigned to federal task forces. Further, the funds go to support police officer training center, community education and for maintenance and operation of law enforcement equipment and facilities.

The forfeiture program has, quite expectedly, seen more forfeitures in some years than in others. That is to be expected as forfeiture is a law enforcement tool, not a

revenue source. The equitable sharing program is key to keeping the ranks of police in the fight against drug activity in our community and in the region. The program is a great example of cooperation between federal and local law enforcement. In the more than thirty years that have passed since the Comprehensive Crime Control Act of 1984 authorized federal officials to implement a national asset forfeiture program, asset forfeiture has become, by the Department of Justice's own estimation in its Equitable Sharing guide, one of the most powerful tools for targeting criminals, including drug dealers and white collar criminals.

The loss of this funding will have a significant negative effect on the federal government's ability to effectively investigate violent crimes, gun crimes, and high level drug crimes. Much of the casework done through the task force system across the country is through the participation of local participating police agencies. In the St. Louis Area alone there are five (5) formally constituted federal task forces under the control and supervision of the FBI, DEA, etc., and on these five task forces thirty-six (36) local law enforcement officers from twenty-two (22) county and municipal jurisdictions serve as full time Task Force Officers.

According to the Department of Justice, this action was brought about by The Bipartisan Budget Act of 2015 (P.L. 114-74) and the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2016. The consequence of the combined effect of more than 1.2 billion dollars in rescission may not have been readily apparent at the time of passage, however it is clear that the Department of Justice projects it cannot make equitable sharing payments due to these two Acts. While DEA and other agencies are working to try to restore part or all of the program, it is important that as a body we inform our Senators and Representatives about the impact of this suspension of the program.

Assets Forfeiture Fund Rescission Impact on Equitable Sharing Program

The purpose of this letter is to explain the financial implications of recent budget legislation on the Department of Justice Asset Forfeiture Program (Program), including equitable sharing. The Bipartisan Budget Act of 2015 (P.L. 114-74) enacted in November included a \$746 million permanent reduction, or "rescission," of Asset Forfeiture Program Funds. In light of that \$746 million reduction, we intended to implement measures similar to those during sequestration in FY 2013 when we continued to make equitable sharing payments but at a reduced amount.

However, the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2016, signed into law on December 18, 2015, includes an additional \$458 million rescission in the FY 2016 budget. In order to maintain the financial solvency of the Program, the Department has already begun implementing cost reduction measures to absorb the combined \$1.2 billion rescission.

While we had hoped to minimize any adverse impact on state, local, and tribal law enforcement partners, the Department is deferring for the time being any equitable sharing payments from the Program. Thus, effective immediately, the Department will defer all equitable sharing payments to our state, local, and tribal partners and transfers of any items for official use. Payments that have already been executed by the U.S. Marshals Service will be transmitted to recipients. Funds already disbursed to state, local, and tribal agencies may continue to be expended and reported in accordance with the *Guide to Equitable Sharing*.

By deferring equitable sharing payments now, we preserve our ability to resume equitable sharing payments at a later date should the budget picture improve. In other words, if additional receipts in cases without identifiable victims are deposited later in FY 2016, there is a possibility that the Department can resume its sharing on some or all of the deferred payments if there are sufficient funds in the budget. The Department does not take this step lightly. We explored every conceivable option that would have enabled us to preserve some form of meaningful equitable sharing while continuing to operate the Program and meet our other fiscal obligations. Unfortunately, the combined effect of the two reductions totaling \$1.2 billion made that impossible.

The Department remains committed to the Program and to the state, local, and tribal partners that are integral to its success. We will take all appropriate and necessary measures to minimize the impact of the rescission and reinstate sharing distributions as soon as practical and financially feasible. RESOLUTION NO. 2016-1
EAST-WEST GATEWAY COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS
PETITION REGARDING FEDERAL EQUITABLE SHARING PROGRAM

A resolution of East-West Gateway Council of Governments that petitions members of the U.S. Congress to action need to restore the Federal Equitable Sharing Program.

WHEREAS, the East-West Gateway Council of Governments (the Council) is the Metropolitan Planning Organization, and Council of Governments, for the St. Louis region; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Council includes the chief local elected officials of the St. Louis region; and

WHEREAS, on December 21, 2015 the Department of Justice announced that it suspended, for some indefinite and unknown period of time, the Federal Equitable Sharing program; and

WHEREAS, through Federal Equitable Sharing police agencies around the country provide officers to serve on federal task forces or participate in federal investigations; and

WHEREAS, Federal Equitable Sharing funds may be spent by the law enforcement agencies pursuant to a very limited list of activities approved by the Department of Justice in its “Guide to Equitable Sharing for State and Local Law Enforcement Agencies” as well as Department of Justice’s “The National Code of Professional Conduct for Asset Forfeiture”; and

WHEREAS, in the eight counties in this region, five in Missouri and three in Illinois, Federal Equitable Sharing funds go to pay the salary of police officers who replace the police officers who are assigned to federal task forces, as well as officer training, community education and for maintenance and operation of law enforcement equipment of all types; and

WHEREAS, Federal Equitable Sharing assists the local police in their fight against drug activity in the St. Louis metropolitan community and throughout the United States community; and

WHEREAS, in the more than thirty years that have passed since the Comprehensive Crime Control Act of 1984 authorized federal officials to implement a national asset forfeiture program, asset forfeiture has become, by the Department of Justice’s own estimation in its Equitable Sharing guide, one of the most powerful tools for targeting criminals, including drug dealers and white collar criminals; and

WHEREAS, the loss of Federal Equitable Sharing will have a significant negative effect on the federal government’s ability to effectively investigate violent crimes, gun crimes, and high level drug crimes; much of the casework done through the task force system across the country is through the participation of local participating police agencies; and

WHEREAS, in the St. Louis Region alone there are five (5) formally constituted federal task forces under the control and supervision of the FBI, DEA, etc., and on these five task forces thirty-six (36) local law enforcement officers from twenty-two (22) county and municipal jurisdictions serve as full time Task Force Officers.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the East-West Gateway Council of Governments petitions Senators Roy Blunt and Claire McCaskill of Missouri and Senators Dick Durbin and Mark Kirk of Illinois, as well as Representatives Wm. East-West Gateway is the St. Louis metropolitan area's federally designated metropolitan planning organization (MPO) and is a federal-aid recipient. As a federal-aid recipient, EWG is required to develop a Title VI Program which demonstrates how the agency will ensure compliance with the nondiscrimination requirements expressed in Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 as well as Executive Orders pertaining to Environmental Justice and Limited English Proficiency (collectively referred to as Title VI). Guidance from the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) through the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) also requires that EWG's Title VI Program be updated every three years and that the Council approve the updated Title VI Program. Staff has completed the required update of the Council's Title VI Program, which continues to reflect the agency's commitment to nondiscrimination and inclusion in all of its programs and activities.

In accordance with FTA guidance, EWG's Title VI Program includes: the Title VI Assurance that represents EWG's agreement that it will comply with DOT's nondiscrimination requirements; a step-by-step Title VI complaint process; data analysis related to the region's hard-to-reach populations; and extensive discussion of how the agency will ensure appropriate and fair treatment of the citizens we serve.

The draft Title VI Program document was open for public comment between December 7, 2015 and January 7, 2016. An open house was held to take comments and answer questions at the EWG office on January 5, 2016. Staff did not receive any comments on the draft Title VI Program.

Subject: Amendment to the FY 2016 Unified Planning Work Program: addition of Elements 2.10a County Roadway Curve Evaluation (Jefferson County) and Inventory and 2.10b Intersection Alternatives Feasibility Study (City of Kirkwood); revision to 2.11 Multimodal Transportation Planning and 2.13 Great Streets Initiative; increase in funding for 2.35 Water Quality Coordination- Watershed Planning; and revision of the IDOT funding allocations

All planning projects funded with federal transportation dollars are required to be in the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). The Missouri Department of Transportation has requested that East-West Gateway amend the FY 2016 UPWP to include two Traffic Engineering Assistance Program (TEAP) projects to be administered by MoDOT: one project for Jefferson County, Missouri and one project for the City of Kirkwood, Missouri. The TEAP will fund 80% of the cost of the projects and the local project sponsors will provide 20% matching funds. The projects total \$10,000 each and the recommended UPWP work elements are attached.

Two work elements, 2.11 Multimodal Transportation Planning and 2.13 Great Streets Initiative require changes to their activities and products. The revision to 2.11 will allow us to replace the production of a bicycle inventory manual with maintaining an inventory database to document the bicycle network of the region. This database will be more up to date than a printed manual as facilities change constantly throughout the region.

The attached work element for 2.13 has been revised to replace the single Great Streets planning document initially envisioned with four strategic planning reports for the selected projects. The reports will describe existing conditions, priorities, options, and specific implementation strategies for two projects in St. Louis County and two in the City of St. Louis.

The changes to 2.35 Water Quality Coordination – Watershed Planning element is necessary to align the element with the application for funding accepted by MoDNR for a grant to update to the Meramec Watershed Management Plan. The plan was last

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updated in 2012. The US EPA, through the MODNR water quality program will provide \$75,000 in federal funds and matching funds of \$60,000 will be provided by several local partners.

The funding will enable EWG to work with multiple partners within the three counties along the Meramec and to identify priority projects for future funding through the USEPA 319 program, and from other funding sources, including Soil and Water Conservation District funds. The watershed management plan update will evaluate projects based on water quality protection and improvement, aquatic species protection, and financial commitment of the required matching funds.

The transportation planning funding in the FY 2016 UPWP was based on the projected FHWA and FTA planning funds from the Missouri Department of Transportation and the Illinois Department of Transportation along with state metropolitan planning funds available from IDOT. Those funding amounts have subsequently been revised by IDOT. The available planning funds by source changed as follows: FHWA increased \$6,612; FTA decreased \$8,524; and State Metropolitan Planning Funds decreased by \$478. The overall net change results in a decrease in funding totaling \$2,390.

The attached UPWP funding schedules have been revised to reflect the change in IDOT funding by work element.

Staff Recommendation: Staff recommends that the FY 2016 UPWP be amended as follows: add the two elements, 2.10a County Roadway Curve Evaluation (Jefferson County) and Inventory and 2.10b Intersection Alternatives Feasibility Study (City of Kirkwood); revise the activities and products for elements 2.11 Multimodal Transportation Planning and 2.13 Great Streets Initiative; revise the activities, products and funding for 2.35 Water Quality Coordination- Watershed Planning as attached; and revise IDOT funding for the transportation planning funded work elements as shown in the attached funding schedules.

Staff further recommends that the Executive Director be authorized to negotiate and enter into funding agreements with MoDNR, Great Rivers Greenway, Missouri Department of Conservation, and The Nature Conservancy to conduct the work for element 2.35 and to amend the IDOT funding agreement as described above.

Available Funding

East-West Gateway estimates that \$4,809,000 will be available in Consolidated Planning Grant funds, through the Missouri Department of Transportation, for the program year beginning July 1, 2015. This estimate is based on the projected unspent funds available from prior years. Based on the activities budgeted in this document plus an estimated allocation of funding from the 2015 federal fiscal year, we project that \$4,049,000 will be available for carryover to our FY2017 UPWP.

IDOT does not allow the MPO to use prior year balances for the FHWA and FTA metropolitan planning funds. IDOT has provided a funding mark for EWG of \$1,001,567 from the FY2016 apportionment. Our estimated expenditures are based on this assumption.

EWG will have approximately \$554,506 available as match in 2015 from accumulated per capita contributions and TIP fees. We've estimated that \$551,282 will be required to match the new funding and an additional \$3,125 will be required for the carryover funding.

Subject: Authorization to Enter into Contracts for Great Streets Initiative Planning

Date: January 12, 2016

In December, the Council released a Request for Proposals (RFP) to conduct planning services for five Great Streets Initiative (GSI) projects, including Woodson Road in Overland, Gravois Road in Affton, 14th Street in north St. Louis City, and Dr. Martin Luther King Junior Drive in St. Louis City. Also included is Highway 159 in Smithton, Illinois. The five separate projects will develop strategic plan documents consistent with the GSI process and goals. Deliverables are structured to clarify the communities' goals and prepare the project sponsors to finalize engineering and analysis for implementation. Responses to the RFP were due on December 28, 2015.

The Council received submittals from 11 firms. The submittals that the Council received for each projects are summarized in the attached table.

The selection committee was comprised of six people, including staff from St. Louis City, St. Louis County, the Village of Smithton, the City of Overland, and EWG.

The selection committee members reviewed, scored, and ranked the submittals. The consultants listed below received the highest rank from the committee and were selected as the firms to be recommended for contract award for each of the projects. The firms noted in the table as an "Alternate Firm" received the second highest rank from the selection committee.

Staff Recommendation: Staff recommends that the Board of Directors authorize the Executive Director to negotiate and execute contracts with each of the consultants that were selected to perform Great Streets Initiative planning work for each project, as noted in the table above. The combined total value of consultant contracts for each project shall not exceed:

- Woodson Road: \$70,000
- Gravois Road: \$75,000
- 14th Street and MLK \$140,000 combined
- HWY 159 \$30,000

In the event that a contract cannot be successfully negotiated with any given consultant, staff recommends identical authorization to negotiate and execute a contract with the “Alternate Firm” that is listed in the table above.

Staff also recommends that the Board of Directors authorize the Executive Director to enter into funding agreements with the City of Overland, St. Louis County, and St. Louis City to provide the local match for the projects in the following amounts:

- City of Overland – maximum amount of \$14,000
 - St. Louis County – maximum amount of \$15,000
 - St. Louis City – maximum amount of \$28,000

East-West Gateway Council of Governments (EWG) is requesting to revise the FY 2016-2019 TIP, *Connected2045*, and related Air Quality Conformity Determination to add 13 new projects.

Transportation Alternatives Program

EWG conducted a solicitation for project applications through the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) in September 2015 with applications due on December 7, 2015. TAP provides funding for on- and off-road pedestrian and bicycle facilities, infrastructure projects for improving non-driver access to public transportation and enhanced mobility, community improvement activities, environmental mitigation, and safe routes to school projects. The TAP funding is suballocated to the St. Louis area through MoDOT and EWG received 29 applications requesting \$16.0 million in federal funds.

EWG sought feedback from the public on the 29 projects that were submitted for funding. The feedback period was from December 17, 2015 – January 4, 2016. The project information was posted to the EWG website and a form was available to offer feedback on each project. At the end of the feedback period EWG received 417 comments, of this the vast majority (389) were for two projects. Project feedback is summarized in **Attachment A**.

The projects were evaluated by Council staff using criteria based on principles in the long range plan, *Connected2045*. Thirteen projects were recommended based on \$8.0 million in TAP funding available. The recommended TAP projects are summarized in **Attachment B**.

The recommended projects have been posted to the EWG website for public comment. The public comment period is from January 7 – January 22. Typically, the public

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comment period ends prior to the mailings to the EAC and Board. However, a summary of public comment to date will be handed out at the EAC meeting and a full summary will be handed out at the Board meeting. To give project sponsors with TAP applications that were not recommended an opportunity to apply for Surface Transportation Program (STP-S) or Congestion Mitigation Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ) funds, the schedule for this TAP round was expedited. STP-S and CMAQ applications are due on March 3, 2016.

Staff Recommendation: Staff recommends that the FY 2016-2019 TIP, *Connected2045*, and related Air Quality Conformity Determination be revised to add 13 new projects as detailed in the attachments. These projects are exempt with respect to air quality in accordance with federal regulations (40 CFR 93.126).

Grant's Trail

I use the green ways frequently for commuting and fun. I would love be to have a connection to Grant's Trail. This will help keep riders safe. No need to cycle on roads to get to the trail.

Right now the connection between the trails is over the highway without even sharrows – or a guard fence going northbound – and down a busy road without sharrows that is poorly maintained with drivers often going 40-50mph. Having the trails connect would enable a larger 'circuit' ride for many

It would also be great to connect RDP through River City Casino to the Mississippi Greenway/Jefferson Barracks Park trail in some manner. These three trails all are very close in proximity and it doesn't make much sense for them to be disconnected.

I'm 70, and not as brave about riding in busy streets as I used to be. Pathways like these keep me on my bike.

I think doing this would greatly increase people's use of these trails. It's connection makes them more usable for both recreation as well as transportation

It gives cyclists and runners more options to avoid riding with traffic.

My only suggestion would be to make the trails narrower (they're so wide on River Des Peres and Grant's) and save money to extend them lengthwise, not width-wise.

I absolutely support the extension; however, could we PLEASE not use those cobblestones at intersections? My family uses the trail to inline skate and those doggone cobblestone cause wreckage EVERY single time

Tower Grove

I walk and run the park often, and there is a need more increased pedestrian crossing, ramps and bus stops.

Pedestrian and ADA access could use some improvements around the park. More and better marked crosswalks are needed.

This is a highly trafficked area for motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians. The area is not as safe as it needs to be for bicyclists and pedestrians. We need to account for the safety of non-motorists with safer crosswalks and sidewalks and increased and improved bicycle lanes. Right now the bicycle lanes intersect with car lanes, making it highly dangerous for bicyclists, especially along Arsenal. We also need a speed bump at the west facing side of the roundabout at Center Cross to reduce the speed of maniacal drivers who zip through the roundabout like it's a speedway. Before deciding on a project design or strategy, consult with bicycle commuters and recreational bicyclists who live in the project zone and neighborhood associations in the project area.

Date: January 12, 2016

Staff is requesting authorization to expend funds in support of regional security that will improve the region's disaster preparedness and response capabilities. Funding will come from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) and the Assistant Secretary of Preparedness and Response (ASPR) Hospital Preparedness grant programs. Attachment A summarizes these purchases totaling **\$483,101**. Also attached is a summary description of all budgeted expenditures from the UASI grants (Attachment B).

- 1. All Ready Preparedness Media Campaign** – The STARRS All Ready committee has developed various media campaign materials that help promote disaster preparedness initiatives throughout the region. We are requesting approval to purchase media space from Metro Transit through its media consultant, Direct Media Incorporated. Purchases can include MetroLink station area windscreens, MetroLink interior cards, MetroBus end tails, and MetroBus interior cards. The Preparedness Media Campaign will be placed at station areas and on trains and buses that will reach both Illinois and Missouri Metro Transit riders. Total costs will not exceed **\$30,000**.
- 2. Ballistic Protection Equipment** – We are requesting approval to purchase the following Ballistic Helmets and Vests for the St Louis Regional Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Task Force and law enforcement tactical operations personnel in support of active shooter situations involving mass casualty incidents.
 - 12 Ballistic Communications Helmets** – For the St. Louis Regional EMS Taskforce from Safeware, Inc. Total cost will not exceed **\$17,928**;
 - 43 Ballistic Helmets** – 18 ballistic helmets for Franklin County Sheriff's Department and 25 ballistic helmets for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department from Safeware, Inc. Total cost will not exceed **\$29,322**;
- 3. Bus Stretcher Ambulance Conversion Kit** – We are requesting approval to purchase two Bus Stretcher Ambulance Conversion Kits that will allow temporary transformation of any passenger bus into a transport vehicle of up to 12 non-

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ambulatory patients in an emergency situation (e.g. evacuation of hospital/nursing home, transport of multiple patients from a mass casualty incident). The kits include frames, stretchers and ramps to allow loading of gurneys and wheelchairs. The St. Louis City Emergency Management Agency (CEMA) will store the kits in crates when not in use. They can then be assembled quickly during an emergency or preassembled and installed for planned events. Total costs will not exceed **\$71,426**.

- 4. Gateway Volunteer Network (GVN)** – The GVN is a St. Louis regional program supported by STARRS which was created in 2013 as an association of local Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) units that provide support to critical incident response teams during a public health emergency anywhere in the Region. Currently, there are seven MRC units that are members of the GVN and work together to support local health departments, nurses, and first responders during a public health crisis. The current GVN members include: the City of St. Louis, Franklin, Madison, St. Clair, St. Charles and St. Louis Counties, and the East Side Health District in Illinois. Throughout the year, the GVN members meet to discuss volunteer development, regional and county specific public health issues, and develop contingency plans to coordinate assistance during a regional health crisis.

We are requesting approval to hire a consultant that will develop various media promotional materials that the GVN can use to promote the local MRC units and recruit residents to their programs. The promotional materials will include videos, photographs, and print advertisements which will be used by STARRS and the GVN to attract prospective volunteers. Total cost will not exceed **\$49,297**

- 5. Incident Support Team (IST) Training** – The St. Louis Regional IST is comprised of trained first responders and emergency management personal from across the region. It is designed to work as a team supporting local authorities at incident command posts or in emergency operations centers during regional, statewide, and national incidents. The IST specialties include incident action planning, documentation, and communications support which improves upon command and control initiatives during major incidents and disasters. We are requesting approval to provide the following three IST training courses through the with University of Missouri Fire Rescue Training Institute (MUFRTI) which will improve the response capabilities of the IST personnel. The courses are;

- All Hazard Incident Management Team training, which consists of 40 hours of training for 30 students at a cost of \$29,500;

- Division/Group Supervisor training, which consists of 24 hours of training for 30 students at a cost of \$8,700; and,
- Planning Section Chief, which consists of 32 hours of training for 30 students at a cost of \$10,300.

Total costs will not exceed **\$48,500**

- 6. Infection Control Officer Training** - The Ryan White law and National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) 1581 standard state that every fire, EMS and law enforcement agency in the United States must have a designated Infection Control Officer to manage bloodborne pathogen and airborne droplet exposure issues that may affect staff. Therefore, we are seeking authorization to contract with Infection Control / Emerging Concepts to train regional first responders and other applicable agencies and their staff on the following three training courses: 1) Basic Designated Infection Control Officer Training, 2) Advanced Designated Infection Control Officer, and 3) OSHA / Bloodborne / Airborne / droplet Train-theTrainer course. These training programs will cover the various laws and regulations that must be considered to establish a comprehensive program, core components of an effective post-exposure management program, roles and responsibilities of the Designated Infection Control Officer, and conducting OSHA training on bloodborne pathogens and airborne / droplet diseases. Total cost will not exceed **\$16,815**.
- 7. Laptop Computers** – We are requesting approval to purchase eight laptop computers for the City of St. Louis Unified Command Vehicle. The vehicle's existing laptops have become out dated and can no longer support today's operating system software. Total cost will not exceed **\$17,657**.
- 8. Metro Air Support Video Downlink** – In 2013 staff received approval to enter into a contract with the Vislink Group to install video monitoring equipment in the Metro Air Support aircraft. This began the first phase of the project which provides the region with an airborne video reconnaissance capability for first responder and emergency management agencies across the region. Phase 2 of the project placed long range receivers at public safety sites in St. Charles and St. Louis Counties in Missouri. This allowed live streaming video signals from the aircraft to be shared securely via the internet and viewed in one or more regional local Emergency Operations Centers during a major incident. Phase 3 of this project involves placing additional long range receivers on a radio communication tower in Jefferson County, Missouri. Therefore, we are requesting approval to provide a sub-award grant to Jefferson County 911 Dispatch for the purchase and installation of video receivers from the Vislink Group. The total cost will not exceed **\$112,500**.

- 9. St. Louis Regional Alternate Care Sites Plan** - The St. Louis Regional Hospital Alternate Care Sites Plan (ACS Plan) was developed in 2012 to provide guidelines for the establishment of one or more regional hospital alternate care sites (ACS) during large-scale disasters that overwhelm regional hospital capabilities. The ACS would be independent of any one particular hospital organization or hospital system and could be equipped and staffed by regional healthcare partners collectively and/or by qualified volunteers.

When the need arises, the activation and coordination of the ACS plan is accomplished through the St. Louis Medical Operations Center (SMOC). The SMOC is a regional organization staffed by representatives from St. Louis healthcare organizations and, when physically activated, is stationed at one of the local county emergency management agency emergency operations centers within the St. Louis region.

Although the ACS plan has been developed there is a need to create logistical and operational guidelines for activation & implementation of the plan. Additionally, there is a need for an ACS staffing plan which contains guidelines for the number and types of positions that will need to be filled in order to staff the site as well as job action sheets for those positions and the development of ACS templates for individual hospital to integrate into their existing emergency operations plans.

Therefore, we are requesting approval to contract with Hagerty Consulting to provide consultant services for Phase II of the St. Louis Regional Alternate Care Sites plan. Total costs will not exceed **\$89,656.**

The purchases described in this memo are being made in accordance with the agency's procurement policy.

Staff Recommendation: Staff recommends that the Board approve the expenditure of funds as follows:

- for the purchase of Metrolink windscreens, Metro bus tails, and Metro Bus interior cards from Metro Transit through its media consultant Direct Media, Inc. in an amount not to exceed **\$30,000;**
- for the purchase of 12 Ballistic Communications Helmets for the regional EMS Task Force from Safeware, Inc in an amount not to exceed **\$17,928;**

- for the purchase of 43 Ballistic Helmets for the Jefferson and Franklin County, Missouri Sheriff's Department from Safeware, Inc. in an amount not to exceed **\$29,322;**
- for the purchase of two Bus Stretcher Ambulance Conversion Kits from First Line Technology, LLC in an amount not to exceed **\$71,426**
- allow the Executive Director to enter into a contract with Yellow Brick Creative to provide promotional materials for the Gateway Volunteer Network in an amount not to exceed **\$49,297**
- allow the Executive Director to enter into contract with the University of Missouri Fire Rescue Training to deliver the All Hazard Incident Management Team, Division/Group Supervisor and Planning Section Chief training in an amount not to exceed **\$48,500;**
- allow the Executive Director to enter into a contract with Infection Control/Emerging Concepts, INC. to provide Infection Control Officer Training consisting of the Basic Designated Infection Control Officer, Advanced Designated Infection Control Officer, and the OSHA/Bloodborne and Airborne Train-the-Trainer courses from in an amount not to exceed **\$16,815;**
- for the purchase of eight laptop computers from Veteran Corps of America in an amount not to exceed **\$17,657;**
- allow the Executive Director to enter into a sub-award agreement with Jefferson County 911 Dispatch for Phase 3 of the regional video downlink project in an amount not to exceed **\$112,500;** and,
- allow the Executive Director to enter into a contract with Hagerty Consulting to provide consulting services in the development of phase II of the St. Louis Regional Alternate Care Sites Plan in an amount not to exceed **\$ 89,656,**

for a total amount not to exceed **\$483,101** from the UASI and the ASPR Hospital Preparedness grant program.
