CALL TO ORDER

The Executive Advisory Committee was called to order by Chair Steve Gregali.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF JANUARY 21, 2014 MEETING

Mr. Hillhouse advised of a change to the January 21, 2014 minutes to properly reflect that the meeting was called to order by *Vice-Chair Steve Gregali*. Motion was made by Mr. Schnell, seconded by Ms. Masson, to approve the minutes as amended. Motion carried, all voting aye.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Development of the Fiscal Year 2015-2018 Transportation Improvement Program

Jason Lange, EWGCOG, summarized important timelines associated with developing the program, including those for solicitation for projects, project development workshops, and public participation, and he outlined anticipated funding amounts for STP and CMAQ programs in Illinois and for STP, CMAQ, and BRM projects in Missouri. He noted that the final TIP would be presented to the Board for approval in June.

Update of the Council's Title VI Program

Jim Wild, EWGCOG, advised that the Agency is required to prepare a Title VI document that ensures that federally funded programs contained in its UPWP prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, religion, and national origin. He advised that the draft would be available within a week and that the final document would be presented for approval in April.

Illinois Division of Traffic Safety – Drive for Tomorrow

Patty Ambrose, IDOT, summarized the no-cost program, *Drive for Tomorrow*, sponsored by IDOT, in partnership with local businesses and corporate sponsors, to educate students from participating schools on the perils of impaired, distracted and irresponsible driving, and the importance of seat belt use. The four day course is taught by industry professionals, and uses instruction and virtual simulation devices to supplement and reinforce classroom and behind-the-wheel instruction to allow drivers education students to experience real-life road dangers in a classroom setting. The program, mirrored after a similar program in Williams County Illinois, was last held in November 2013 in Collinsville, IL and was attended by 10 different schools with a total of about 1,400 students. She advised that the cost for such an event is approximately \$50,000.

Draft FY 2015 Unified Planning Work Program

We are providing the draft FY 2015 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) this month for your review and information. The UPWP describes all of the planning work activities that the staff and other local agencies will undertake over the coming year beginning on July 1. The document serves as the scope of work for contracts with the states and federal agencies that provide much of the funding for planning and related activities in the region.

Metropolitan planning organizations are required by federal law to adopt a UPWP every year covering all transportation funded planning activities. Our document includes all of the proposed activities that are planned by staff throughout the agency from all funding sources. Some of the activities described in the UPWP are currently underway and will continue during the next twelve months and others will start at various times during the year depending on funding availability.

We are projecting new funding for the upcoming fiscal year in the amount of \$10,683,007, as shown in the FY 2015 Funding Summary – New Funding in Period on page x. A large portion of the projected funding is either passed through or is expended on behalf of other agencies. Our in-house costs for the agency are estimated at \$6,103,000 for the life of the grants represented.

Over the next month the UPWP will be reviewed and discussed with our funding agencies and participating jurisdictions/agencies. Some of the funding levels shown in the UPWP are estimates and may be revised as more detail is received. We also welcome comments and questions from the Board of Directors. After approval from the funding agencies and input from the Board, we will bring it back to the Board in April for approval.

Missouri Ballot Initiative and Transportation Project Priority Setting Process

In September of 2013, Missourians for Safe Transportation and New Jobs, a group comprised of contractors, consultants, and labor unions, filed an initiative petition with the Missouri Secretary of State proposing an additional 1 percent sales tax to fund transportation improvements in the state. The group has since ceased collecting signatures and the effort is now proceeding through the legislative process via HJR 68 (House) and SJR 48 (Senate). Despite the change in strategy, the proposed ballot language remains identical - it would initially be in effect for 10 years and bring in an estimated \$7.1 billion in revenue during that time. Of that revenue, 5% would be distributed directly to counties through a County Aid Transportation Fund, 5% to cities through a Municipal Aid Transportation Fund, with the remaining 90% to be expended at the discretion of the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission.

The funds raised by this tax are intended to be very flexible and may be used, according to the bill text, to "plan, locate, relocate, establish, acquire, construct, maintain, control, operate, develop, and fund transportation facilities, such as, but not limited to aviation, mass transportation, transportation for the elderly and handicapped persons, railroads, ports, waterborne commerce, intermodal connections, bicycle, and pedestrian improvements." MoDOT has stated, however, that highway improvements must be on the state system.

East-West Gateway's Role

In order to be presented to voters, the ballot question must include a statewide list of transportation projects to be funded by the proposed tax. To create such a list, MoDOT has requested each MPO and RPC in the state to undertake a regional prioritization process.

Working with Burns and McDonnell, a facilitation consultant provided by MoDOT, East-West Gateway has developed a process for prioritizing projects across all modes

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for the St. Louis region. This process will include a wide range of regional transportation stakeholders across all modes and jurisdictions:

Identification of candidate projects (March/April)

The initial project list includes the hundreds of projects and transportation needs identified in previous MoDOT and EWG efforts, such as On the Move, OneSTL and the current regional transportation plan, RTP 2040. In advance of involving external stakeholders, this initial candidate list will be pared down to a more reasonable and manageable length by EWG staff working with regional planning partners. A list for each mode will be developed as follows:

- Highways Recent past prioritization efforts (e.g. RTP 2040) will be used to develop a manageable list of highway projects.
- Transit –Projects identified during On the Move will serve as a starting point for the Transit list. Modifications will be made based Moving Transit Forward (Metro's long-range transit plan) and through discussion with transit stakeholders.
- Bicycle & Pedestrian The bicycle and pedestrian project list will be informed by Great Rivers Greenway's Gateway Bike Plan. The projects identified during On the Move, especially those located in counties not included in the Gateway Bike Plan, will also be reviewed for possible inclusion.
- Freight Projects concerning rail (passenger and freight), airports, water ports or other modes will be identified using the list of priorities identified in On the Move and the St. Louis Regional Freight Study.

Review of draft performance measures and scoring criteria (March/April) EWG has a well-developed and supported set of 10 Guiding Principles, and has identified a correlated set of draft performance measures to accompany MoDOT's priorities outlined in On the Move, including maintaining the system, safety, economic growth and transportation choice. These draft measures will be reviewed for applicability in the scoring and prioritization process and refined as necessary.

Stakeholder Workshop#1: Finalize Candidate Projects and Criteria Weighting (Mid-April)

Workshop attendees will refine the candidate projects lists by mode to identify any potential gaps, and approve the lists. They will also discuss and confirm project evaluation criteria based on EWG's 10 Principles, performance measures, as well as MoDOT's planning goals.

Project Scoring (Mid-April – Mid-May)

EWG staff will score the candidate projects using the criteria, performance measures, and any weighting established in workshop #1. The scored projects will be grouped into tiers (low/medium/high) for presentation and discussion at Workshop #2.

Board Update (April)

After workshop #1 and project scoring, staff will update the EWG Board of Directors at its April 30, 2014 meeting.

Stakeholder Workshop #2: Review of Scored Project List and Recommendation of Final Prioritized Sales Tax Project List (Mid-May)

Attendees will review and discuss the results of the scoring process. A recommended project list for the region will be finalized.

Cost Estimating (May)

EWG will work with MoDOT to obtain cost estimates for prioritized projects.

Board Approval of Sales Tax List (May)

The final project list will be approved by the EWG Board of Directors at its May 25, 2014 meeting.

Finalized Improvement List (Late May – Mid June)

EWG submits regional improvement list to MoDOT- St. Louis District.

MoDOT Chief Engineer recommends 10-year improvement list to MHTC (August)

MHTC approves final list (September)

General election (November 4, 2014)

Update on Local Program Projects - FY 2014 Reasonable Progress

March 12, 2014

The Policy on Reasonable Progress applies to Missouri projects or programs included in the Transportation Improvement Program, which are funded by the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement, On-System Bridge, Surface Transportation-Suballocated, and Transportation Enhancement programs (Illinois uses a different process).

Reasonable progress will have been made if a project has advanced to the point of obligating all federal funds programmed for that project in the current fiscal year, regardless of the phase of work (i.e., Preliminary Engineering (PE), Right of Way Acquisition (ROW), or Plans Specifications and Estimates (PSE)/Construction). If a project fails to obligate the programmed federal funds by September 30 of the current fiscal year, the funding will be forfeited and returned to the regional funding pot. Obligation of federal funds means that funds have been set-aside by the Federal Highway Administration for reimbursable work on a project. Actual progress toward implementation is measured against the schedule submitted by the project sponsor in the project application. The fiscal year begins October 1 and ends September 30.

Fiscal year (FY) 2014 represents the largest amount of projects and federal funds that have been monitored by Council staff since this Policy was enacted. There are 165 projects and nearly \$142 million in federal funds programmed in FY 2014. As of this date, 33 projects and \$29.4 million in federal funds have been obligated.

The table below shows the number of projects and unobligated federal funds as of this date. The deadline to obligate federal funds in FY 2014 is September 30. Only 21% of the federal funds programmed in FY 2014 have been obligated to date compared to 43% in FY 2013 and 40% in FY 2012.

Projects with PE and ROW programmed appear to be on track to obligate funding by the end of the fiscal year, while \$109.4 million in federal funds remain unobligated for construction. The concern at this time is the amount of unobligated construction funds. Local sponsors are required to submit a project tracking report to East-West Gateway twice a month. Staff has been following up with sponsors who appear to be falling behind schedule.

MoDOT Local Programs must review and approve the final PSE for these projects and approve right of way clearance within six months. MoDOT Local Programs assures us that they will have staff on-hand to deal with the influx of projects as the fiscal year comes to a close.

A one-time schedule extension is available for projects that have fallen behind schedule, however, the sponsors are required to demonstrate the delays are beyond their control. The deadline to submit the one-time extension is on June 2, 2014. Staff will continue to monitor the Local Program projects and provide an update at the June meeting.

Amendment to the 2014 Unified Planning Work Program to change funding for work element 2.39: Monitoring and Implementation of the All-Hazard Mitigation Plan for the Missouri Portion of the Region

March 12, 2014

The regional All-Hazard Mitigation Plan for the St. Louis area in Missouri is required to be updated by March 2015. The last update was completed in 2010. Staff requests that the work element 2.39: Monitoring and Implementation of the All-Hazard Mitigation Plan for the Missouri Portion of the Region in the FY 2014 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) be revised.

We anticipate that the work will begin in April of this year and be completed by March 2015. The funding consists of \$96,750 from the Missouri State Emergency Management Agency and \$32,250 from East-West Gateway. The updated UPWP element describing the work tasks is attached.

Staff Recommendation: Staff recommends that the 2014 Unified Planning Work Programs be amended to revise work element 2.39: Monitoring and Implementation of the All-Hazard Mitigation Plan for the Missouri Portion of the Region. Staff further recommends that the Executive Director be authorized to enter into a funding agreement with SEMA to conduct the necessary work.

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MONITORING AND IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ALL-HAZARD MITIGATIONPLAN FOR THE MISSOURI PORTION OF THE REGION 2.39

- 3. Review and collect information on hazard mitigation actions, grants, and the regulatory environment.
- 4. Monitor and review new and additional data and maps relating to hazard vulnerability and specific mitigation projects.
- 5. Respond to inquiries from participating communities, school districts, and community college districts on mitigation inquiries and ideas.
- 6. Work with SEMA, FEMA, and STARRS on mitigation planning updates.

The FirstNet Coordination funding award to the Missouri Department of Public Safety is being passed down to the Missouri Association of Councils of Government (MACOG), and the agency is requesting that our Urban Area host regional outreach events to educate local users (law enforcement, fire service, emergency medical services, emergency management, and critical infrastructure public safety partners) about the National Public Safety Broadband Network and solicit their input.

Amendment of the 2014 Unified Planning Work Program to add 2.86:

The award period for this project is January 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015, during which East-West Gateway will coordinate five (5) regional meetings on behalf of the Missouri Department of Public Safety. The total award will not exceed \$14,250. It is required that the first meeting be held between April 1, 2014 and June 30, 2014, with the remaining meetings to be conducted in the next fiscal year.

Subject: Regional Security Expenditures

March 12, 2014

Staff is requesting authorization to expend funds in support of regional security that will improve the region's preparedness and response capabilities. Funding will come from the Assistant Secretary of Preparedness and Response (ASPR) Hospital Preparedness Program grant and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) grant programs. Attachment A summarizes these purchases totaling **\$734,807**. Also attached is a summary description of all budgeted expenditures from the UASI grants (Attachment B).

1. <u>Critical Response Teams – EMS</u>

Basic Disaster Life Support (BDLS) Training – We are requesting approval to provide one Basic Disaster Life Support Training course for Emergency Medical Service (EMS) personnel in the region. This one day course for 50 students will provide a foundation for medical personnel to learn the necessary skills needed to handle basic disaster life support events. This training will also assist with trauma team building and functional roles, principles of triage, patient management, and resource allocation, trauma skills, and the principles of disaster management. Total cost will not exceed **\$12,500.**

Advanced Disaster Life Support (ADLS) Training – We are requesting approval to provide one Advanced Disaster Life Support Training course to first responders in the St. Louis Urban Area. This two day course for 48 students will expand on the Basic Disaster Life Support training. Participants will develop the skills needed for pre-hospital and hospital healthcare providers to build capacity for trauma and advanced disaster life support event management. Disaster simulation exercises will be presented as part of this training. Total cost will not exceed \$25,200.

In addition, the Board of Directors approved a combined ADLS / BDLS training from the National Disaster Life Support Foundation at the October 2013 meeting. A Train the Trainer component needs to be added to the training, which will raise the total cost of the previously approved combined ADLS/BDLS by **\$4,800** bringing the new total cost to **\$41,400**.

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2. Critical Response Teams – Law Enforcement

Law Enforcement Surveillance Vehicle - The St. Louis region lacks covert surveillance equipment to effectively conduct both rolling and stationary surveillance of individuals or groups of individuals for intelligence gathering purposes. Counter surveillance allows regional intelligence officers to detect and mitigate hostile surveillance during the target selection and planning stages, which is the time that the operation is most vulnerable to interdiction.

A covert surveillance vehicle would provide the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department's (SLMPD) Intelligence Division the ability not to disrupt society while keeping those who potentially pose a threat under tight visual control. The vehicle would allow intelligence officers to maintain the integrity of an operation, and will not only provide valuable insight into the workings of criminals but aid antiterrorism efforts, both foreign and domestic. With this capability, intelligence officers would be able to capture and identify abnormal behavior, suspicious individuals, vehicles or objects that are out of place. Good counter surveillance is proactive; it provides a means to prevent an attack from happening. This capability will allow the SLMPD Intelligence Division to provide video and still images and capture audio of potential terrorist activity. The surveillance vehicle would enhance regional collaboration through the sharing of critical intelligence. The information would be disseminated through the St. Louis Fusion Center and distributed throughout the region in an effort to thwart any planning of current and/or future attacks. The equipment will be available region wide to assist regional law enforcement agencies with counter-terrorism investigations, information and intelligence gathering, recognition of indicators and warnings, and analysis and sharing of information.

Therefore, we are requesting approval to purchase a sport utility vehicle containing video and still photography equipment as well as audio recording capabilities and computer hardware with WiFi access. Total cost for the vehicle and equipment will not exceed **\$137,307**.

3. Medical Surge - Hospitals:

Patient / Victim Evacuation Sleds – We are requesting approval to purchase additional patient/victim evacuation sleds for the region's hospitals. These sleds are used during a hospital evacuation to transport patients out of hospital through stairways during events where power is out or the hospital infrastructure is otherwise impacted such that elevators are not working. We are requesting a total of 570 adult sleds, 105 bariatric sleds, and 110 neonatal infant baskets. The sleds will

be distributed to 15 hospitals in both Illinois and Missouri. Total cost will not exceed **\$260,000**.

Hospital Emergency Communications – When a major incident occurs that impacts one or more hospitals it is important that communications links are established between hospitals, EMS agencies, and the St. Louis Medical Operations Center (SMOC). Therefore, we are requesting approval to purchase additional radio equipment for Missouri hospitals. This second phase purchase will provide radios to the outlying rural hospitals in Missouri Region C as well as provide additional units to the urban facilities so they can have radios both in their emergency departments and their incident command centers. This equipment will provide communication redundancy and allow hospitals to integrate with EMS and emergency management agencies on the regional land mobile radio network and the Missouri Statewide Wireless Interoperable Network. Therefore, we are requesting approval to purchase 43 portable radios and 65 control base stations for a total cost that will not exceed **\$295,000.**

Funds for this purchase will come from the Missouri ASPR grant program which can not be used in Illinois. However, the Illinois hospitals receive ASPR funding from the State of Illinois Department of Health and have purchased similar radios for their hospitals and associated healthcare response partners.

All of the purchases described in this memo are being made in accordance with the agency's procurement policy.

<u>Staff Recommendation</u>: Staff recommends that the Board approve the expenditure of funds as follows:

- allow the Executive Director to enter into a contract with NDLS National Training Center to provide one Basic Disaster Life Support course in an amount not to exceed \$12,500;
- allow the Executive Director to enter into a contract with NDLS National Training Center to provide one Advanced Disaster Life Support course in an amount not to exceed \$25,200;
- allow the Executive Director to add \$4,800 to a contract with NDLS National Training Center to provide a combined Advanced Disaster Life Support / Basic Disaster Life Support course in an amount not to exceed \$41,400;

- for the purchase of a sport utility vehicle containing audio, video and still photography capture equipment and computer hardware with WiFi access from Sirchie Finger Print Laboratories in an amount not to exceed \$137,307;
