CALL TO ORDER

Warren Robinson, Vice President, called the meeting to order.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF APRIL 11, 2019 MEETING

Motion was made to approve the minutes of the April 11, 2019 meeting. Motion carried, all voting aye

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Directors Report

Mr. Gragnani reviewed the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's FY 2019 Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) grant funding distribution. He pointed out that the St. Louis region received an 8.33% increase in funding for FY 2019, which relates to a \$250,000 increase over the FY 2018 funding amount. In reviewing the funding distribution, which listed the 31 funded UASI jurisdictions, he explained some of the disparity in how the grant funds were distributed but could not provide a definitive explanation on how DHS determines funding levels, which are tied to the annual Metropolitan Statistical Area Risk Validation process. Ms. Leykam inquired if the Kansas City region received UASI grant funding from the FY 2019 grant program. Mr. Gragnani advised that Kansas City was left off of the UASI funding once again.

East-West Gateway Sub-Grant Award Update

Staci Alvarez presented to the Board an update on the status of sub-awards for the 2016 UASI and 2018 HPP grants. Of the 25 planned sub-awards, 3 will not be issued this grant cycle, 9 have been fully executed, and 13 are either pending final review/approval by the sub-recipient or pending signatures. Given the grant funding deadlines, East-West Gateway (EWG) is putting a deadline on when the signed sub-awards have to be received by EWG. The deadlines are necessary to ensure that EWG has sufficient time to purchase equipment/supplies, have the items delivered, and pay for the items before the grants expire this summer. The deadline for the 2016 UASI grant is June 10, 2019. The deadline for the 2018 Hospital Preparedness Program (HPP) grant is May 31, 2019. Staff will continue to work with the sub-recipients to get the sub-awards approved and signed before the deadlines.

Staci advised that the sub-award process for the 2017 and 2018 UASI grants has not yet begun and will not start until staff has completed the process for the 2016 UASI / 2018 HPP grants. In the next sub-award cycle, EWG will require sub-recipients to provide a financial point of contact so that we can expedite the risk assessment process. Sub-recipients that have a questionnaire on-file with EWG will not be required to complete another questionnaire to receive a sub-award for the 2017 or 2018 UASI grants. The only exception to this rule is if the sub-recipient will receive a different type of sub-award during the 2017/2018 UASI grant cycle.

CCTA Program Update

Althea de Guzman, Regional Program Coordinator for the St. Louis Regional CCTA program, provided an update on activities to the Board. This update encompassed activities and changes in stakeholder engagement since January 2019. Over the last five months, the program engaged over 1,000 additional stakeholders, including an increase in public, private, and military representatives. Althea stated that since January, three additional tasks have been fully executed: 10 operational guide development workshops, seven operational guide training workshops, and two river response workshops have been completed. The training workshops included an interactive tabletop exercise building upon existing initiatives in the region, including a full-scale exercise at Scott Air Force base. The operational guide workshops averaged 4.8/5.0 on feedback ratings, collected from over 200 individuals who attended the activities. Upcoming activities include a public information functional exercise on June 12 and response drills in August.

Sub-committee Reports

- Communications Core Group – Chief Greg Brown report the committee had no report at this time
- Emergency Management – No report
- Emergency Medical Services (EMS) – Deputy Chief Nick Harper reported the committee had just met and discussed setting up and inventory review. They also discussed the grant sub-award process and reviewed a timeline on the development of a committee charter. He stated the committee will review other committee charters to compare similar tasks and direction.
- Hazardous Materials – No report
- Healthcare Coalition – Vanessa Poston stated there was no report at this time.
- Healthcare Preparedness – John Whitaker advised the committee reviewed the Healthcare Coalition Charter and Bylaws and are considering developing their own charter and bylaws that will define the Healthcare Preparedness Committee’s mission and outline its goals and objectives. John then reported that he will be resigning from the STARRS Board as the Healthcare Preparedness Chair and Board representative. He stated he has accepted a position with the Missouri Department of Health in Jefferson City, MO. He commented further that the committee voted to appoint Michele Tanton, St. Louis Children’s Hospital as the new Committee Chair and Cody Minks, SSM Health as the committee vice-chair.
- Law Enforcement – Chief Dave Todd stated there was no report at this time.
- Mass Fatality – Roger Smith stated the committee continues to review their existing response plans and will have a few revisions soon. They also reviewed and approved their FY 2019 UASI grant applications
- Public Health – Justen Hauser advised there were no updates from PH this month, they will have their next meeting on Monday May 20th at the Barnes Learning Institute.
- St. Louis Area Regional Coalition of COADS - Warren Robinson stated the committee is working on a Multi Agency Resource Center exercise that will test the ability to provide assistance to multiple people from across the region. This will be a single event type exercise that the committee is currently developing objectives that will guide the exercise play.
- Training and Exercise – Captain Derek Reiger advised the region’s Multi Year Training & Exercise Planning meeting will occur in September. He also stated that the region was selected to participate in a FEMA Cyber Security exercise. More information will follow regarding this important regional test of existing cyber protection methods.
- Urban Search and Rescue (US&R) – Brian Gettemeier sent the committee report to Nick Gragnani and asked that he convey the following information:

The Hackney target inventory audit was completed. The teams brought all 5 of the US&R tractor trailers together at a warehouse in Earth City where East-West Gateway staff supervised and inventoried and performed an assessment on the US&R equipment. The committee had their 2nd quarter committee meeting where they reviewed the FY 2019 UASI grant funding applications. The minutes to this meeting will be forthcoming. Three were two team activations since the last report. These include:

- Team #1 (St. Charles County) activated for a wide area search for a lost & injured hiker in Busch Wildlife. Local assets had been searching for the patient for about 2 hours. Shortly after the activation the patient was found by St. Charles County Police.

- Team #5 (Jefferson/Franklin County) activated for a wide area search.

The task force continues to monitor the flood watch, there have been no activation or movement at this time due to flooding in the region.

ACTION ITEMS

Finance Committee Recommendations to the FY 2019 UASI Grant Application

Nick Gragnani advised the Board of the recent meeting of the STARRS Finance Committee. The Committee met on Monday, May 6, 2019 to review the investment justifications that were submitted for funding from the FY 2019 Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) grant program. The Committee reviewed the 41 projects that were submitted from the STARRS committees which totaled \$7,468,460. Mr. Gragnani advised the FY 2019 UASI award (after Management and Administrative costs for East-West Gateway and the State of Missouri) totaled \$2,933,125. He explained in order to determine the best way to distribute the limited funding, the Finance Committee members each completed the force comparison voting process which sets the priority for which of the 41 projects were the most important to the region and helps the committee determine funding priorities .

Nick explained that, in addition to determining the FY 2019 UASI funding allocations, the committee also redistributed FY 2017 and FY 2018 UASI washout funding, which totaled \$500,000. He then explained how the committee reviewed each funding request and pointed out the key decisions made by the committee members. After a brief discussion a motion approving the Finance Committee’s funding recommendations was made and seconded. Motion passed with one no vote from Gary Christmann.

Regional Security Expenditures

Nick Gragnani, summarized staff’s recommendation of the following expenditures, totaling \$238,982. The expenditures will be funded from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security’s Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) grant program.

In October 2018, Koch joined the Saint Louis County Health Department as an Emergency Response Planner.

Subject: Regional Security Expenditures
Date: August 5, 2019

Staff is requesting authorization to expend funds in support of regional security that will improve the region's disaster preparedness and response capabilities. Funding will come from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) grant program. Attachment A summarizes these expenditures totaling **\$171,614**. Also attached is a summary description of all budgeted expenditures from the UASI grants (Attachment B).

Project Manager for St. Louis Regional License Plate Recognition Database (LPRD) and Mugshot Recognition Technology (SMRT) Databases – The Project Manager for the LPRD and SMRT is a part time position within the St. Louis Fusion Center. The position facilitates and oversees the implementation of the regional law enforcement license plate reader and mugshot recognition databases. The city of Richmond Heights Police Department has agreed to provide the LPRD/SMRT Project Manager on a part time basis and the city of Richmond Heights agreed to accept a sub-grant award for the funding.

In May staff requested approval to continue funding the LPRD/SMART Project Manager within the St. Louis Fusion Center and the Board authorized a sub-award to the city of Richmond Heights for an amount not to exceed \$43,982. Staff was recently notified that the position's hourly rate had changed and the sub-award needs to be amended to increase the total amount awarded to the city of Richmond Heights. Therefore, we are requesting approval to amend the sub-award to the city of Richmond Heights to increase the award amount by \$7,632 for a new total not to exceed **\$51,614**, for the period of July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2021.

St. Louis Regional Cybersecurity Coordinator – The Presidential National Security Strategy identified cybersecurity as a leading challenge to national security, today and in the future. Additionally, the regional Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment has identified major gaps in the cyber realm and the U. S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) requires that recipients of DHS grant funding must fund a cybersecurity initiative.

To that end, the St. Louis Regional Cybersecurity Coordinator position will address identified gaps and deficiencies in St. Louis Regional cybersecurity, reduce the region's threat landscape, enhance the overall security posture, and improve response, mitigation, recovery, and resiliency to any major cyber-attack. Additionally, the Coordinator will work closely with cybersecurity specialist within the Missouri Office of Homeland Security, the FEMA cybersecurity advisor, the United States Secret Service and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The position's number one job task will be securing election systems, conduct regional cyber training and exercises, and promote cyber security practices to the region's stakeholders.

Therefore, we are requesting approval to enter into an agreement with the city of St. Louis to provide funding to support the St. Louis Regional Cybersecurity Coordinator position within the St. Louis Fusion Center. The total cost for salary and benefits for the Cybersecurity Coordinator position will not exceed **\$120,000** for the period of October 1, 2019 through September 30, 2020.

All expenditures described in this memo are being made in accordance with the agency's procurement policy.

Staff Recommendation: Staff recommends that the Board approve the expenditure of funds as follows:

- to amend the sub-award to the city of Richmond Heights, Missouri for the Automated License Plate Reader and Mugshot Recognition Technology System Project Manager to an amount not to exceed **\$51,614**; and,
- for a sub-award to St. Louis City, Missouri for the St. Louis Regional Cybersecurity Coordinator position in an amount not to exceed **\$120,000**;

for a total amount not to exceed **\$171,614** from the UASI grant program.
