CALL TO ORDER

Warren Robinson called the meeting to order at 0901 and Staci Alvarez took attendance and confirmed a quorum.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF THE MAY MEETING

Warren Robinson requested approval for the March 2021 Board meeting. Don Feher motioned and was seconded. The motion to approve the minutes was approved.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Directors Report

Gregg Favre shared that staff has been working diligently on the UASI 2021 grant application process. Committee project applications have been reviewed, cleaned up and the projects scored. The finance committee packet should go out early next week to members. Following that process this Board will hold a special session to review and approve the results.

Gregg also shared an update on the ongoing improvements to Metro Air Support communications now available in Illinois counties. Gregg also shared that Training and Exercises would become a focus as the year continues. Gregg also shared that May 20^{th} is the date of the upcoming all day CCTA Functional Exercise and thanked the many members of the board that have been involved with the CCTA process. Gregg also thanked Gary Christmann for his service to the City, the region and to STARRS as he has announced his retirement from the City Emergency Management Agency. Gary will be staying active in the region and will still be active with STARRS processes.

Covid Update

Brad Zoref shared an update on the ongoing Covid-19 response. Currently the state positivity rate is 5.7%, however the St. Louis region (SHP Region C) is closer to 7.8% positivity. Some counties have seen steady increases in positivity over the last few weeks. The reproductive rate for Missouri is 0.94, however the rate for the St. Louis is 1.13 signifying the possibility of growth in the region. Hospitalizations have been steady between 200 and 220 and ventilator usage has hovered in the 20s. The mortality rate continues to be low, likely in part due to the vaccinations of the at-risk populations.

Brad also shared that the availability of vaccinations has improved in spite of the issues with the Johnson & Johnson vaccine. The region is seeing a steady stream of Pfizer and Moderna coming into the region. It was originally thought that larger quantities of vaccine (over 200,000) would reach Missouri in recent and coming weeks, but this did not occur but we continue to receive about 90,000 Pfizer and 62,000 Moderna. More vaccine is on-hand now than was originally projected, it is estimated that 60% of the population has scheduled or received at least a first dose. Registrations for vaccinations are lower than previously anticipated. Health Departments are looking at hosting smaller vaccination clinics to draw additional people in. STARRS continues to work with agencies in the region on the ongoing vaccination processes.

Following a question by Joann Leykam, Brad elaborated that the Pandemic Task Force and others continue to monitor the issues with the Johnson & Johnson vaccine, and that he had not heard of anyone in the region having had the concerning reaction.

Subcommitee Reports

Joan Leykam shared an update from the Communications Core Group explaining that they met yesterday and are looking at restarting normal meeting schedules. Shawn Icenhower shared that a meeting and updates had occurred on the regional ChemPack project. The SMOC team also met this week to review SMOC Standard Operating Guides and other SMOC components. Jason Campbell shared an update from the Healthcare Preparedness committee as well. Kurt Frisz shared that Law Enforcement had also met recently.

ACTION ITEMS

By Law Review by Committee & Resolution

Warren Robinson shared a summary of an issue related to the By-Laws and the Board Secretary position, summarizing it as something of a "catch-22". The Executive Committee is in discussions on how to resolve the Board Secretary issue, and they would like to nominate Ryan Weber to the position. They will look at the by-laws to try and prevent this issue from recurring in the future. Warren requested a motion to place Ryan Weber on to the Executive Committee for placement into the position of Board Secretary. Gary Christmann made a motion and Don Feher seconded with the motion being passed. Ryan Weber is now on the Executive Committee and is the Board Secretary.

Finance Committee Review

Warren Robinson shared that the Finance committee membership needed updating and proposed changes. Tony Falconio and Derek Reiger motioned to accept his proposal, the motion passed and the new Finance Committee was formed.

Regional Security Expenditure

Gregg Favre shared there were four total expenditures for the month with a total of just over one million dollars from the UASI grant. Two expenditures are related to Fusion Center staff, one for the regional License Plate Reader project and the fourth for a thermal camera for Metro Air Support aircraft. Warren requested a motion to approve the expenditure, Joann motioned and was seconded, the motion carried.

Other Business

No other business was brought before the Board.

NEXT MEETING & ADJOURNMENT

Warren shared that May 13th is the next regular Board meeting date but reminded the group that a special meeting would occur prior to that related to the UASI 2021 grant process.

Warren requested a motion to adjourn, which was provided and seconded. The motion carried unanimously; the meeting was adjourned at 9:34AM
